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## Section I: Organization

Columbia County Public Transportation (CCPT) is a County Transportation Authority, authorized in Chapter 36.57.010-090 RCW, located in Columbia County, Washington. CCPT began providing public transportation services in 1996, and then formalized in March 2005 and became a County Transportation Authority. In April 2005, CCPT initialized vanpool services along with their demand response service. Our system map covers all of Columbia County, including the towns of Dayton and Starbuck. In addition, CCPT offers service to Waitsburg and Dixie residents and on occasion to Prescott residents, all located in neighboring Walla Walla County. There currently is no public transportation service available to those towns otherwise. In 2014 CCPT began connecting with Garfield County Transportation to get passengers into the Lewiston Idaho/Clarkston, WA area. Our five-member board of directors consists of three County Commissioners, the Mayor of Dayton, and the Mayor of Starbuck. Our board of directors generally holds public meetings at the CCPT office building on a quarterly basis.

As of July 31, 2019, Columbia County Public Transportation employed:

- 11 full-time equivalents in the Operations Division
- 1 Part-time equivalent in the Operations Division
- 3 full-time equivalents in the Administration Division
- 14.75 of these full-time equivalents were for demand response services; and
- 0.25 of these full-time equivalents were for vanpool services.

## Section II: Physical Plant

Columbia County Public Transportation leases a building from the Port of Columbia at 507 Cameron, Dayton, WA. This building contains the administration offices, as well as indoor garage space to park seven CCPT vehicles and maintenance section. The Columbia County Auditor and County Treasurer's Office are located at the Columbia County Courthouse also in Dayton, WA.

The maintenance services for CCPT have been performed in house since July 3 2017. Major repairs will be contracted out to the authorized dealers.

The Appendix contains the completed forms for the State's public transportation management system for our owned and contracted revenue vehicles and facilities.

## Section III: Service Characteristics

In 2017, Columbia County Public Transportation provided Demand-Response services, as well as vanpool services.

CCPT buses operate Monday through Friday 6:00 AM – 6:00 PM during the school year and 7:00 AM – 6:00 PM during the summer months. We received an extended service grant which allows us to open on Saturdays from 9:30 AM to 3:30 PM for the next two years and the demand for it has been amazing. CCPT is also contracted with People for People, a Medicaid Brokerage, to provide Medicaid transportation 24/7. In addition, CCPT provides all transportation services for the Columbia County Health District, which includes Dayton General Hospital, Booker Rest Home, Columbia Family Clinic, Waitsburg Clinic, and Columbia County Public Health.

The CCPT vanpool services operate independently, but generally operate between the hours of 5:00 AM – 6:00 PM, depending on the operating hours of the various agencies that use our vanpool vans.

Section IX shows our operating data for 2017.

In addition to our regular schedule, CCPT also operates demand response services for the general public during several community events throughout the year that may or may not fall on a weekend.

### Section IV: Service Connections

Columbia County Public Transportation is the only public transportation service available to Columbia County residents.

Columbia County Public Transportation provides services to the following public transportation facilities:

- Dayton to Walla Walla Regional Airport for air transportation services.
- Dayton to Walla Walla to the Valley Transit Transfer Center so that Dayton, Dixie and Waitsburg residents can connect with Valley Transit Buses for travel around Walla Walla and College Place.
- Dayton to Walla Walla to connect with Grapeline for transportation to Pasco to make connections with the nearest Greyhound station in our area as well as with Amtrak which are both located in Pasco, WA. A connection to the Pasco Airport is also provided.
- Dayton to Dodge Junction to make connections with Garfield County Transportation so that persons can get transportation into Lewiston Idaho and Clarkston, WA.

## Section V: Activities in 2018

As our service continues to grow, we have found that we can no longer operate with many of our drivers being part-time on-call. All our drivers are now full-time working 30-40 hours per week. Our support staff in the office includes a Finance Manager, three dispatchers, one who is our public records officer and one is a part time operator, a Transit Supervisor, and a Safety and Maintenance technician. All but two of these positions are also drivers.

The current fleet of CCPT's vehicles consists of (3) 14 passenger mini-buses, (6) 18 passenger mini-buses, (1) 4 passenger cross-over vehicle that is also used as an administrative vehicle and one ADA accessible mini-van. In addition, we have (5) 12 passenger vanpool vans and (2) 8 passenger vanpool vans. CCPT requires all our bus operators to obtain and carry Class "C" Commercial Driver Licenses, regardless of the size of vehicle they will be operating. This gives CCPT greater flexibility when purchasing new vehicles as our service continues to grow. The only way to meet the demand is by having larger vehicles in our fleet.

CCPT also began procuring surveillance camera systems into all our new vehicle purchases. The addition of the surveillance camera systems in our buses has proven to be a huge benefit when monitoring our operations.

CCPT devotes numerous hours of training annually to all our employees and continues to offer a very rigorous training schedule to all new operators. CDL training is a large portion of our new operator training program to those we hire who do not already hold a Commercial Driver's License.

CCPT addressed the Washington State Department of Transportation's Transportation Objectives through the following action strategies:

Mobility: Facilitate movement of people and goods to contribute to a strong economy and a better quality of life for our citizens. CCPT operates a demand service in rural Southeastern Washington State. Columbia County is the third smallest county in Washington State with a population of 4,047. CCPT transports residents of Columbia County and the cities of Waitsburg and Dixie in Walla Walla County to the city of Walla Walla, which is the regional multi-model hub. Poverty rate is high in the county with 13.5% of the population living below the poverty level. The age of the population in Columbia County is high with a 27.9% over the age of 65 compared to the state average of 15.4%. Walla Walla is the regional hub for all transportation service with connecting bus service to the Tri-Cities. Walla Walla has a regional airport and is the regional center for medical services. CCPT operates 12 round trips a day to the Walla Walla area with many of these passengers being Medicaid and passengers with disabilities. CCPTs focus is to facilitate the movement of people to the area's regional hub.

<u>Preservation: Preserve and extend prior investments in existing transportation</u> facilities and services they provide to people and commerce.

CCPT works diligently to preserve its vehicles. CCPT's buses are washed and maintain to the highest standards. They are cleaned daily after each trip to make sure that the passengers have a clean and enjoyable experience. Our on-hand maintenance personal service and maintain the vehicles to make sure that they exceed FTA's useful life. CCPT's facilities although leased are also maintained at the highest level. The exterior is washed, and the grounds maintained so that the public sees a clean facility. The interior of the facility is maintained both by CCPT janitorial staff and professional janitorial personal. Both rolling stock and facilities undergo a monthly inspection to catch any unscheduled repairs or maintenance.

Safety: Target construction projects, enforcement and education to save lives, reduce injuries and protect property. CCPT made the decision to require Class "C" Commercial Drivers Licenses for all drivers. This additional education and training should help keep injuries to a minimum as well as help in protecting our property due to increased awareness from all this training. All drivers are required to obtain their CDL within 6 months of hiring. As mentioned above, the addition of surveillance cameras in the buses aids in protecting the property as well. All CCPTs staff is First Aid/CPR trained and certified and part of the annual refresher training includes a course on effectively using a fire extinguisher which are kept on our vehicles and facilities.

## Section VI: Proposed Action Strategies, 2016 - 2021

The proposed changes in Section VII, below, are action strategies that reflect upon the following state Transportation Service Objectives.

Economic Vitality: Improve freight movement and support economic sectors that rely on transportation system such as agriculture, tourism and manufacturing. CCPT will continue to assist with transportation needs during local events and advertise their service in event programs and banners in order to assist the community in promoting tourism in Columbia County. We continue to be active in community events and enter our vehicles in a couple of different parades throughout the year to make our vehicles be visibly seen when large numbers of people are in town. In 2017 and 2018 CCPT ran fare free passenger service to the Walla Walla's Farmers Market as a promotion in conjunction with the

Farmers Market and other areas of Walla Walla. In addition, we are using social media like Facebook to encourage ridership and agency transparency.

Mobility: Facilitate movement of people and goods to contribute to a strong economy and a better quality of life for our citizens. Columbia County is a very poor county with minimal employment, education, and shopping opportunities. Walla Walla constitutes a 64-mile round trip and is the nearest city that Columbia County residents can go for employment and higher education opportunities not otherwise offered in Columbia County. CCPT runs 11 to 12 round trips into Walla Walla daily providing access to Walla Walla Community College, Medical Services and connecting service with Valley Transit which allows connecting service to shopping other Education Facilities. CCPT will continue providing the demand response service offered in the city of Dayton, as well as continue contributing to a strong economy by providing transportation into Walla Walla. One of CCPT's missions is to provide for a better quality of life to our community.

Preservation: Preserve and extend prior investments in existing transportation facilities and the services they provide to people and commerce. The voters of Columbia County approved a sales tax levy which passed overwhelmingly. The levy amount does not cover but a small amount of our operating expense. Preservation on our current operations will depend heavily on grants from Washington Department of Transportation in conjunction with the Federal Transit Administration. These grants provide us the opportunity provide the high level of service to our service area. CCPT also collects fares but the amount generated from a small population is negligible. CCPT continues to leverage our partnership with these partners to help with fares for the less fortunate. These partners like Walla Walla Community College, Dayton School District, Waitsburg School District, Department of Health and Social Services, Blue Mountain Action Council and Dayton General Hospital contribute to the transportations needs and are greatly appreciated.

<u>Safety: Target construction projects, enforcement and education to save lives, reduce injuries, and protect property.</u> CCPT will continue our rigorous employee safety and training program to keep accidents and injuries to a bare minimum. The implementation of requiring Commercial Drivers Licenses plays a huge part in this. In addition, the installation of surveillance cameras in the buses has made a huge impact on protecting our property and investments.
